

Library Director Report November 2023 Anita Marple

Leadership Changes: Shari Haskin's retirement this month marks the next chapter of administrative restructuring for the library system. Rachel Arnold has several successful months of settling in to the Lander Manager role, Kathy Gettelman begins her new role as Dubois Branch Manager on December 1, and we're in the midst of a search for a Riverton Branch Manager. I look forward to working with the managers in professional development and in leading the library system.

I am grateful for the time working closely with Shari during the past three years. Her experience and knowledge were exactly right for the Assistant Director role; her 24-year investment in the Fremont County Library System will continue to positively impact our service to the community.

While we continue to search for a new Riverton manager, I will be working in Riverton most days. The Youth Services Lead Librarian position is also open, so filling these two key positions will be central to my time until we hire.

Foundation Directory Database Training: The Lander Library is part of Rural Access Equity program with the Candid company, an entity which maintains databases for nonprofit fundraising. The Foundation Directory, Foundation Maps, and GuideStar sites connect grant makers and grant seekers, and the Lander Library offers on-site access to these databases free to our patrons. I have been meeting individually with local nonprofit groups to provide orientation to using these sites. We have partnered with the Lander Community Foundation to promote this opportunity with Lander's 50+ nonprofit groups. Any nonprofit in the county may access these sites at the Lander Library.

Wyoming Legislative Session: The next legislative session begins in February, and I continue to work on the Wyoming Library Association's Legislative Committee. We will be following proposed legislation which impacts libraries. As this is a Budget Session, there will be fewer bills on non-budget issues. We know that property taxes will be a hot topic again this year.

The annual WLA Legislative Reception is scheduled for Thursday, February 22, 2024, and will be hosted at the Laramie County Library in Cheyenne. This is an opportunity for the Wyoming library community and state legislators to share a meal and conversation about the work of libraries in our state. I will invite our Fremont County legislators to the event, and--weather permitting--I will travel to Cheyenne for the reception.

FCLS DIRECTOR REPORT 1



Special Revenue Funds July-October: For the <u>first third</u> of the fiscal year, we are in good shape with our special revenue accounts:

Admin (771) Collected 37% of anticipated Fines & Fees; 76% of anticipated Rent Income (meeting room fees)

Lander (772) Collected 72% of anticipated Donations (received \$10,000 from one individual for collection development); received a new grant award of \$4,000 for a special collection development project

Riverton (773) Collected 44% of anticipated Donations

Dubois (774) Collected 33% of anticipated Donations; received a new grant award of \$2,500

We also received a \$1,000 grant from the Wyoming Association of Risk Management which will be used for property security projects, including signage for each building. This grant will go into our General Fund (775) account.

Mid-Year Financial Report: For the January board meeting, I will provide a financial report for our July-December Revenues and Expenditures. While I receive a monthly financial statement from the county, the totals and percentages for Actual compared to Budget are not currently available. This is a county issue related to uploading approved budget numbers to the accounting software. Budget Officer Julie Freese is working with the Commissioners on a new process for budget development with the county department heads and offline department directors. So, in the meantime it requires extra time to track our expenditures versus budget.

Library System Update with County Commission: I will request a place on the Commissioners' December 19 meeting agenda to provide a library system update that will include budget status, patron activity, and policy updates. This will also be an opportunity to answer questions from the Commissioners.
